# *Grand Master's Message:*

July 4, 1965

This month's message has something to do with growth in and among Lodges. If it touches upon some points which may not have something to do with growth, you will please pardon me and my thoughts on the subject. Sometimes I cannot help touching upon two sides of a subject.

Last May, a few weeks after I assumed office, we constituted two Lodges in Okinawa: Clayton W. Roberts Lodge No. 175 and Shurei Lodge No. 176. This month of July, we are constituting two lodges on Luzon: Siete Martires Lodge No. 177 in Balaoan, La Union and Cordillera Lodge No. 178 in Bagabag, Nueva Vizcaya.

We can well be proud that the number of Lodges in our Grand Jurisdiction is increasing from year to year, especially after Liberation. We have "lost" many of our overseas lodges when the Grand Lodge of China was formed in Shanghai in 1949 and the Grand Lodge of Japan in Tokyo in 1957. It was all to the good, however, in that there are now three independent Grand Lodges in East Asia, two of them having come from the Grand Lodge of the Philippines. The two Grand Lodges are doing well as they are; they are increasing in membership and in number of Lodges.

Some curious brethren, when they read the annual listing of Lodges, want to know why there are gaps in the numbering of Lodges and therefore, the numbers are not consecutive. The gaps represent the numbers of the Lodges which became the nuclei Lodges of the Grand Lodge of China and of the Grand Lodge of Japan. It is a matter of tradition that the remaining lodges do not wish to change their names and numbers. In like manner, new Lodges which are organized subsequently, get new names and numbers.

Up to this writing, there are about the same number of Lodges under our Grand Jurisdiction as there were before the two new Grand Lodges were organized. Moreover, there are now more Masons than there were at the time of the annual communication held in 1945, the first after World War II. We have increased in spite of deductions.

The continuing growth of our membership and number of Lodges has been due to the untiring efforts of brethren, too many to mention, who give their time and energies to the organization of new Lodges. We are grateful to them and we are proud of their efforts and their dedication to the spread of Masonry in our jurisdiction. The GAOTU bless them all!

We are especially proud of Mindanao and Sulu. Before the war, there were only eight Lodges there. Now, there are seventeen. Lodges in Luzon have also increased since pre-war days. The province of Nueva Vizcaya is a good example of growth in number of Lodges and in number of Masons. At the outbreak of the War, there was one Lodge in the province. Now, there are four.

There is one regret that I have. Coming as I do from the Visayas, I am sorry to report that there is only one increase in the number of Lodges in that

## YOUR CABLETOW

Under the title "**Aims and Purposes of Our Publication,**" the following was the first article that appeared in **The Cabletow** Vol. 1, No. 1, issued on June 1, 1923:

**"No progressive Mason will deny the necessity of Masonic periodicals. The time when Masonry was obliged to work in the dark is a thing of the dim past. Our Brethren demand further light in Masonry; they are anxious to keep informed of what the Craft is doing in the Islands and abroad; they are ready to welcome with open arms any Masonic literature they know to be regular and authorized in these times when clandestine Masonry is rampant, and year after year we have heard expressed the desire that our Grand Lodge publish something in the nature of an "Official Gazette," informing the Craft in the Islands of the edicts, circulars and decisions of the Grand Master, giving them other news of interest, and, if possible, containing articles on Masonic subjects for the enlightenment and instruction of the thousands of Masons dispersed throughout our widespread Archipelago.**

**"This necessity the CABLETOW has come to fill, and we have no doubt that it will fill it adequately. Owing to the lack of funds in the treasury of the Grand Lodge it has been found necessary to make advertisements a feature of this paper in order to enable its management to get a copy to each Mason in the Islands instead of furnishing only five copies to each Lodge, as contemplated in the Grand Lodge resolution, and to give its readers a creditable, well gotten-up paper of which no Grand Body of the world need be ashamed.**

**"Each issue will contain articles embodying the fundamental features of Masonry, beginning with the "Old Landmarks," which will be found in this issue. The "Ancient Charges" and other important Masonic documents not available to every Mason and which every Mason ought to know, will follow, and the CABLETOW will thus become a valuable library of reference to the Philippine Mason, in addition to being a collection of the edicts, circulars, and decisions published from time to time. The Lodge or Mason having a complete file of the CABLETOW will soon wonder how Grand Lodge and Masonry in these Islands ever got along without this paper, and we predict that in a few years, the first issues of the CABLETOW will be much sought after to complete collections, and we therefore recommend to all the Brethren and Lodges that they carefully preserve the succeeding numbers, because the Grand Lodge cannot guarantee an extra supply for the future. A word to the wise is sufficient."**

**Many years have passed since the first issue of the CABLETOW spread the light of Masonry throughout the Philippines. Since that time many issues**

# OUR RESPONSIBILITIES

*[Address of MW William H. Cantwell, PGM, Grand Lodge, A. F. & A. M. of Delaware before the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of the Philippines, April 1965]*

"What came ye here to do?" To learn to subdue your passions and improve yourself in Masonry? What are you doing to improve yourself in Masonry? How much reading and studying have you done since you were raised to a Master Mason? Are you getting everything out of Masonry that you had hoped for? Are you putting anything into it?

Suppose you had received a medical degree ten years ago and had done no reading or studying about your profession in the meantime. Or, if you had graduated as a lawyer a corresponding time ago, would you be able to competently represent a client before the court if you had not kept up with the law? Let us take one more example. You received a divinity degree many years ago but had not read or kept up with the arts of this craft, how far would you be today in your profession as a minister?

Or, I might give you another illustration on the necessity of study for proficiency. You learned all the letters of the alphabet when you first started in school — all twenty-six of them. But, if Shakespeare, Churchill, or the great literary figures of history, had not studied and rearranged these twenty-six letters, we would not have had their masterpieces of literature.

In like manner, very early in our school career, we learned the digits

— one to ten — and really that is all there are. But our mathematicians, our engineers, and our scientists, have found a way to make formulae and computations so that our bridges, our skyscrapers and our space satellites have been possible.

Very early in life our great musicians and composers became familiar with the eight notes on the musical scale. However, the great masterpieces of Mozart, Beethoven and Paderewski would not have been possible without endless hours of study and practice. So with Masonry. Have you really and truly improved yourself since you represented Hiram the Builder on his journey through the south, the west and the east gates?

Rudyard Kipling, our greatest Masonic poet, once wrote a poem, which, in my opinion, applies to many of us. It is called "The Explorer".

There's no sense in going  
further — it's the end  
of cultivation  
So they said, and I believe it.  
Broke my land and sowed my  
crop,  
Built my barns and strung  
my fences  
In the little border station  
Tucked away below the foothills,  
Where the trails run out  
and stop,  
Till a voice as bad as conscience  
Bang interminable charges

On one everlasting whisper,  
Day and night repeated, so —  
Something hidden. Go and  
find it,  
Go and look behind the  
Ranges —  
Something lost behind the  
Ranges,  
Lost and waiting for you. Go!

The Explorer was satisfied until the voice of conscience urged him on "beyond the Ranges".

What is this art which we know as Freemasonry, and why do we have to study and explore to find its true meaning and import?

The Master Teacher of Galilee was known to teach by parable or by antithesis. For instance, He said, "In My Father's House are many mansions. If it were *not* so I would have told you." Let us think of Masonry as some of the things it is *not*.

It is *not* a religion, even though it is religious in nature. It is very important for us as a Fraternity to not in any way usurp the functions of the church and particularly we do not battle the church as an organized group. As citizens we have a responsibility to express our views and feelings, but, as an institution, we should not be placed in the position of fighting a losing battle even in an apparently worthy cause. The Church in Europe considered that Freemasonry was an enemy, and, as an enemy, it was condemned and persecuted. The door to understanding is opening on a crack. Let's do everything possible to work together for humanity.

It is *not* a social organization, even though we are sociable people. Freemasonry is a way of life and social attainments and social affairs are a means to an end and not an end in

themselves.

It is *not* a Secret Order, even though there are necessarily certain means of recognition and certain rituals which are of necessity kept from the uninitiated. Our membership rolls are open to the public and our places of meeting are well known in the community.

It is *not* a Beneficial Order, even though many of our charities are of great benefit to mankind. The Knight Templar Eye Foundation, The Crippled Children's Hospitals, the Research in Mental Health are but a few of the organized projects and there are hundreds of smaller efforts which testify to our belief in the Brotherhood of Man. But, to the individual himself, Masonry is a luxury. We believe that it is more "Blessed to give than to receive."

It is *not* a Political Organization. As citizens we should take a lively and interested position in Community, State and National affairs but within the body of the lodge our discussions should be tempered with judgment, and here, at least, we must respect our brothers' political beliefs. Our Institution should never, as such, take sides in a National political dispute. We have members of every country, sect, and opinion. It is the only common ground on which these men can meet. Keep it sacred.

We have been talking for some minutes now about what Masonry is *not*. Maybe we should talk a little about the positive side of the picture. We are told in the Entered Apprentice degree that it is an Institution designed for three purposes: to enlighten the intellect, to improve the moral nature, and to raise up humanity the world over.

# WELL DONE

The Mason, putting his trust in God, continuously strives to fulfill his aspiration to reside in that spiritual house not made with hands, eternal in the heavens. He is constantly reminded in this striving by his white apron, which is his badge as a Mason.

This apron inspires him to lead an honorable life. It is "an ever-present reminder of an . . . unblemished purity of life and rectitude of conduct, a never-ending argument for noble deeds, of higher thoughts, or purer actions, and for greater achievements".

The Mason, existing as he does in the world, is subjected to the struggles of the forces of good and evil. He rises and he falls, as the ebb and flow of tides. But ever mindful of his aspiration to attain final perfection, to render himself worthy of the Kingdom of Heaven, he uses his best endeavors, by the grace of God, to rise progressively in his moral and spiritual development. So when his soul shall stand naked before the Great White Throne, there to receive judgment for deeds done in the flesh, it may be his portion to hear from the Supreme Judge the welcome words: "Well done, thou good and faithful servant, thou hast been faithful over a few things, I will make thee ruler over many things; enter thou into the Joy of thy Lord."

These welcome words shall be the reward in heaven from the Supreme Ruler of the Universe for those who

labor faithfully and continuously until their return from their terrestrial abode to their celestial home. Jesus Christ announced this reward to his disciples when He recounted to them the parable of the talents, which is found in Matthew, 25:14 - 30.

Jesus told the disciples that the Kingdom of Heaven is as a man travelling into a far country, who called his own servants and delivered unto them his goods. To one the master gave five talents, to another two talents, and to another one, according to the ability of everyone. And the master immediately left. A talent is equivalent nowadays to about \$1000 or ₱4000.

The servant who received five talents used his initiative and ingenuity and traded with the money and increased it to ten talents. The servant who received two talents did the same and gained another two. But the one that received one talent hid it in the earth.

After a long time the master returned and made a reckoning with them.

The master was pleased with the two who increased their talents and told each of them: "Well done, thou good and faithful servant; thou hast been faithful over a few things, I will make thee ruler over many things:

enter thou into the joy of thy Lord.”  
(Matthew, 25:21)

The servant who hid his one talent in the earth and did not trade with it, came and said to the master: “Lord, I knew thee that thou art an hard-man, reaping where thou has not sown, and gathering where thou has not strewn.

“And I was afraid and went and hid thy talent in the earth; lo, there thou hast that is thine.”

The master was angered and rebuked him in the following simple but emphatic words of Jesus: “Thou wicked and slothful servant, thou knowest that I reap where I sowed not, and gather where I have not strewn.

“Thou oughtest therefore to have put my money to the exchangers, and then at my coming I should have received mine own money with interest.”

The master ordered a servant to take the talent from him and give it to the servant with ten talents.

The lesson from this parable is with a promise of reward or punishment. Jesus pronounced the lesson to his disciples: “For unto everyone that hath shall be given, and he shall have abundance: but from him that hath not shall be taken away even which he hath.”

Jesus also said that the unprofitable servant shall be cast away, and there shall be weeping and gnashing of teeth.

This parable of the talents illustrates two types of servants of God. One type is the faithful servant who uses his initiative and ingenuity, one who is not self-centered and is not fearful to take risks and make sacrifices in his sincere service to his

Creator. He is abundantly rewarded by his Lord. The other type is slothful, apprehensive, and useless. He is cast away.

The parable exhorts God’s servants or stewards to work strenuously to win souls for His Kingdom, so as to hasten the coming of the millenium of the peaceful reign of Jesus Christ on earth.

Masonic principles and tenets, in like manner as the teaching of Jesus Christ, inculcate in the Mason the idea of moral and spiritual self-improvement. The Mason is expected to be a fine example of uprightness and righteousness. He is imbued with prudence, however, not to be self-righteous, not to be critical of the errors of others but should ever be mindful of his own shortcomings.

The Mason is aware that not only the eyes of their brethren in the Fraternity but also those of other people are upon him. He is therefore careful of his actions; he has been enjoined by his teachers that he should show to the world that upon becoming a Mason he has become a better man. He realizes that it is only by being morally and spiritually developed himself that he can be a worthy example to others, and thereby contribute to the total efforts for the moral regeneration of our people.

But the Mason understands that it is not sufficient to be good by himself. No man should be a separate island of righteousness. The Mason believes that he should be positively good, that he should serve God and his fellowmen. He does not hide his talents. He invests them and increases them and enriches the world with goodness.

# THE IMPORTANCE OF AN INDIVIDUAL MASON

Masonry is life and life is action. Like life, Masonry is a force in constant evolution.

In Freemasonry we need organization. We need sound planning. We need willing workmen in the quarries to accomplish results effectively, efficiently, harmoniously in support of what Freemasonry stands for the promotion of that great aim, that goal of all goals — the Brotherhood of Man.

Each one of us is an integral part of the Fraternity. Each one of us is obligated to share in the work to attain its objectives. What you and I are today, and what we are willing to do today, will in a large measure determine the future and destiny of Freemasonry in our country.

The apostle Paul said so aptly, "No man liveth to himself alone." It is likewise true that no Mason liveth to himself alone. In the light of this concept let us examine the three basic challenges upon which is built the major premise that every Mason is a V. I. P. — that very important person who makes his Blue Lodge a vital force for the good of mankind.

The first of these challenges is — *A Mason is a Man of Ideals.*

Every Craftsman, when he first entered the Lodge, and before embarking on his journey in search of truth and its way of life, uttered the words

which expressed his faith in God. He professed a covenant with the Great Architect of the Universe. As surely as day follows night, so it follows that, to meet this challenge, a Mason must be a man of ideals.

Integrity, is the practice of unimpeachable honesty. A man of integrity is a man of loyalty. Loyalty to God, to his fellowmen, and to himself. These three loyalties are one and the same; they are inseparable. A man cannot be honest with God unless he is honest with his neighbor and honest with himself. Integrity must be an ideal for a man who would be a Freemason.

Rectitude of conduct concerns itself with undeviating adherence to moral standards and unimpeachable behavior. Masonry teaches us to develop and practice the highest degree of self-discipline, both mental and physical. Irreproachable behavior and demeanor are important not only among ourselves when in the Lodge, but also rectitude of conduct is certainly an ideal of every Mason, especially when abroad in the world.

Temperance means the practice of moderation, of balance in our daily living habits and in our thinking. It is necessary and commendable to regulate oneself and act with a sense of discretion and propriety. Temper-

ance challenges us to avoid being extremists to the detriment of ourselves and of our neighbors.

Tolerance is that quality of respect for another man's opinions and habits. In short, a sympathetic understanding for the other man's mode of living, his creed, and his philosophy, is most becoming to a man of good judgment. Sometimes we hear a criticism made of an other wise intelligent person that he is opinionated. This is truly a serious indictment for it suggests lack of vision, blindness in the heart as well as in the mind.

Another ideal I would like to describe is that relating to freedom. Men have shed blood that they might experience freedom and liberty for themselves, and for generations yet to come. We should forever thank God that we live in a free country. Ours is the freedom of choice as to whether or not we should go to school and to what school. Ours is the freedom to decide whether to go into business for ourselves or to enter under the employ of another, or be in the government service. We may choose to live in the city or in the province. Ours is the freedom to worship God according to the dictates of our conscience in the church of our choice. But we Masons should know that the ideal of freedom is earned by each one of us only as our responsibility deserves it.

Every Mason must be challenged to reach his high ideals, if he is to live a life of genuine usefulness. Life is made up of dreams, aspirations yearnings, hopes, call them what you may. They are vital parts of our daily life, as our days are filled with decisions. As a man thinks, so will he act in making decisions. But as Masons we should determine and know what we

stand for. Masons must be men of ideals.

The second challenge is that a *Mason is a man of conviction*. I have just said that as Masons we should know what we stand for, therefore, we must have the courage to stand on our convictions. We must stand up to be counted, in the fullest meaning of those words.

Bro. Norman Peale said, "Many people are tired simply because they are not interested in anything. Nothing ever moves them deeply. They become tired. They even become sick. The surest way not to become tired is to lose yourself in something in which you have a profound conviction. The more you lose yourself in something bigger than yourself, the more energy you will have."

Archimedes, the ancient Greek Mathematician and inventor, challenged the world with a great conviction. In explaining the force that could be developed by the proper use of a simple tool, the lever, he said, "Give me a place to stand and I will move the world." "Bro. Goethe, the greatest of German poets, repeated this challenge saying, "Make sure of thy standing place and move the world."

Brethren, have we made sure our standing places as Builders? Freemasonry can indeed move the world. But it needs the courage of every Mason who has lost himself in something bigger than himself. A Mason must be a man of courage, a man of conviction.

Still another challenge to our thinking is that a *Mason is a man of Service*.

If we are men of ideals, and if we are men of conviction, then, to what

extent do we use our potentials, our possibilities, to be of service to others?

As Masons, we must be alert to the opportunities for service in a changing society. Only as we adapt and prepare ourselves to meet its needs can we grow to the stature required of us to merit our standing places in this world.

Opportunities for individual service are numerous and extensive. Some are charitable and humanitarian in the sense of sharing our worldly goods to meet the needs of those less fortunate than we. In this category of giving, does your Lodge have a charity fund for relief and assistance to the widow, the orphan, and the needy?

As men of service we Masons should cheerfully continue to support the Masonic Hospital for Crippled Children. This hospital, operating in the Mary Johnston Hospital, in Manila, is the only charitable institution organized and maintained by Masons in our country. Crippled children of Masons and non-Masons are cared for and treated in this hospital free of charge. It is doing a fine job for those less fortunate children who might otherwise be deprived of a happy and fruitful life in society. Life membership to this hospital is ₱500.00 and can be paid in annual installments of ₱100.00. We urge you to do your part and carry your share.

There are other opportunities for individual service, such as giving of ourselves, of our time, and of our talents. Blood donation programs, which are vital in modern technique in surgery and healing, are a specific example of the giving of ourselves. Community and civic projects in your respective localities offer a challenge unparalleled in the history of man.

Have you organized a DeMolay chapter for your boys? Those who have will know the keen sense of satisfaction in working with young people — the young men who will follow in our footsteps, our country's Masons of tomorrow.

The various fund-raising campaigns for charity, including the Red Cross, Community Chest, and Elks Cerebral Palsy, need organizers and workers. As men of service, we Masons should seek out these opportunities, and accept them gladly when offered. There are other good works to be done which do not carry a Masonic label, but which challenge us just the same to act as Masons should, as men of service to our communities.

Your church needs you. It needs your time and your talents to carry on the work of the Kingdom of God here on earth. The Craftsman who would practise out of the Lodge those great moral and social virtues inculcated in it is an active church member because he is a Mason. The church offers one of the greatest challenges to service, the challenge to make things of the spirit real.

Let us practice the ideas and ideals of Freemasonry. Let every Mason realize that in being a Mason, it is not enough to be a mere ritualist in the Lodge room. The good and true man, being a Mason and a man of ideals, knows that the portion of his talents should be given to other organizations that are working for a better world. Masons should stand out in the fore-front of all groups in social and charity work if they are to be true to their Masonic ideals.

America is great today because the American people had great men like, Bros. George Washington, Harry A.

Truman, Douglas MacArthur, naming only a few who were not afraid to stand for their Masonic ideals. The community in which we live needs our Masonic principles.

We, as individual Masons, should take active interest in public affairs of vital interest to the community and to the country, both domestic and foreign.

Masons should run for public office, and should not be afraid of the word "politics." Masons should participate in governmental affairs instead of leaving the task entirely to professional politicians. We can start an extensive educational campaign that will drive home the point that public office is a public trust, that those in the government are servants of the people and that being elected to high office is an opportunity to serve and not to enrich one's self or abuse his position.

If we could have these points fully understood, then we would probably have less political killings and less bloodshed in our elections. We could run the government on a more business-like basis, and we could probably devote more attention to building up our economy, opening more jobs for the unemployed and raising the general living standards of our people.

We, Masons, have only ourselves to blame if things are not going well in our country today. The reason for the present mess is that we are not taking active interest in the task of running our governmental affairs. We are as a matter of fact indifferent. Let it be said that the crime of omission is just as bad as the crime of commission, by not taking active part in our government and allowing the professional politicians to run our affairs, as they have been doing all these years,

we are in effect allowing ourselves to be partly responsible for the kind of government which many of us have been criticizing and for all the ills that we have today. How well Burke expressed that anomalous phenomenon when he said that all that is necessary for the forces of evil to rule is for enough good men to do nothing.

Luckily the political outlook does not seem to be as hopeless as some of us fear. There is one good thing we can do. We can start a powerful movement in our community to work and vote for candidates who are good and honest men, so venality in office can be minimized, if not totally eradicated.

In our locality there are civic spirited residents who can be drafted to run for municipal councilors. They are good and honest citizens, and busy with their own business, but may be prevailed upon to devote part of their time to municipal affairs. They are not professional politicians and because of their record of integrity and their sense of public service they can undoubtedly be good public servants. They are not after the remuneration which is inconsequential, or after the power and influence that go with the position. All they want is to serve, and serve well. If we have officials of this kind we may be certain of having an honest government, for they will not use their office to enrich themselves but only to serve.

My Brethren, this is a real challenge to us. The power is in our hands to take up the challenge, and acquit ourselves in the test. We must recognize the importance of our being Freemasons in carrying out our responsibilities to God, to our country, to our neighbor, and to ourself. Only as we do this will we become men of ideals, men of conviction, practical men of action and of service.

In the United States we hear so much these days of Freedoms. There is freedom from poverty, for example: freedom from morality in high places in government and freedom from restraint as we witness the various demonstrations and antics of some of our people. This, of course, is our New Great Society. Back through the years it has been known by many other names, but always seems to be accompanied by government give-away and lack of national discipline. I would like to have us think for just a few minutes — and it's terribly hot in here — about three freedoms in connection with the great design of Masonry promulgated by our Masonic forefathers and so needed in our National fibre today. Freedom from Intellectual Poverty (Enlighten the Intellect); Freedom from Moral Decay (Improve the Moral Nature) and Freedom from Self. (Raise up Distressed Humanity). Freedom from Intellectual Poverty in our craft would raise the level of our understanding and consideration to the point that throughout the land in which we live and your land as well the uninitiated and the profane would see our good works and desire to emulate our example. I need not bore you with details of a program of Masonic education because many of your lodges are doing it now. Intensify it.

Freedom from Moral Decay is one of the most compelling requirements in our society today. When Freemasonry first raised its head on the scene of history in the 13th, 14th and 15th centuries, morality was at a low ebb in England and on the Continent. The Church had fallen down on the job of morals, theoretically, it looked after religion. The State was

supreme in the realm of law. No organized agency seemed to be interested in morality. Freemasonry attempted the tremendous task. It is needed today more than ever. Let us all get busy.

Freedom from Self. Our selfishness as individuals and nations over the centuries has been responsible for most of the world's ills. There are two great commandments which we are admonished to observe, "Thou shalt love the Lord thy God" and "Shalt love thy neighbor as thyself." This embraces all of the law and is dramatically illustrated in the up-reach and the outreach of Freemasonry. The selflessness of the great characters of history is ample evidence that the same characteristic, lovingly practiced by the members of our craft, would change the course of history overnight. It is the only element capable of quenching the fires of communism. It is the secret weapon which would overwhelm the godless hordes of evildoers and thus bring the Kingdom of God to come upon this earth. If each of us would forget ourselves for six months we might be able to truly say, "Behold how good and how pleasant it is for brethren to dwell together in unity. It is like the precious ointment upon the head that ran down upon the beard, even Aaron's beard, that ran down to the skirts of his garment. For there the Lord commanded a blessing, even life forevermore."

Then, with Kipling's Explorer, we can say:

God took care to hide that  
country  
Till He judged His people ready,  
Then He chose me for His  
whisper,  
And I've found it and it's yours,

And, no sense in going further  
Till I crossed the Range to see

While this reward is inspiring to the Mason, he is not motivated to work for God and fellowmen with the single purpose of receiving only this heavenly reward. He endeavors to seek first God's Kingdom and His

The Mason is continually engaged in the serene contemplation of the sublime science of morality, and in the efforts for progressive self-improvement until he attains the perfection of righteousness and love. She will sing the role of Tuptim, created on the stage by Doretta Morrow.

Hollywood's Ricardo Montalban will play the Siamese king and Ann Blythe the English schoolteacher.

After Dallas Miss Calbes is scheduled to play Tuptim, the beautiful slave, with another "King and I" company in Warwick, Rhode Island, under the direction of James Hammerstein, son of the late Oscar Hammerstein. Betsy will star.

Miss Calbes is preparing to sing the part of Musetta in Puccini's "La Boheme" for the Canadian Opera Company in Toronto just after her Warwick engagement.

She was asked whether the switch from light to grand opera was difficult.

"There are minor problems," she replied. "I'll be rehearsing La Boheme in the daytime and doing the King and I at night. I have to keep the opera music before me constantly and memorize the Italian words. I'm some kind of machine."

Miss Calbes, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Diego Calbes of Manila is bubbling over with delight that her star is rising in the music world.

"This is the first time I've been working steadily," she said. "After

region, counting from the Liberation when there was general rehabilitation of Lodges all over the country. There were seven in 1947 and now there are eight. However, seven Lodges in the Visayas and Palawan still have to be rehabilitated, namely, those in Capiz, Antique, Palawan, Romblon, Masbate, Negros Occidental, and Cebu. Before the War, the Visayas and Palawan had fourteen Lodges as against eight in Mindanao and Sulu. Now, Mindanao and Sulu have seventeen lodges and the Visayas and Palawan have eight.

It is my hope that within this Grand Lodge year some brethren might see fit to rehabilitate even one Lodge in the Visayas. It is my further hope that henceforth at least one Lodge will rehabilitated every year. Rehabilitation is not exactly growth in number of Lodges, but it is growth in number of brethren and in a way, it will also mean growth in number of Lodges since the rehabilitation of pre-war Lodges will add to the present number of Lodges on the roll of our Grand Lodge.

Each project of the sort suggested in the preceding paragraph will be a great and important undertaking. We know what to do in each case.
